PRESIDENT'S PATTER By Rob Quinn

By the time you read this, the Vernal Equinox will have occurred and we all will be looking for the first signs of Spring. Will there be tree buds and bugs, or just another round of snow coming? Help celebrate the coming of Spring by joining us at the next PBH HOA meeting on April 24, 2018. We start with a potluck supper at 6:00 PM and our general meeting begins at 7:00 PM. Among other things, we plan to have a presentation by Mike Palamara on current progress and plans for the essential fire mitigation work of BMFPD, and tips on mitigating your own property. With Spring coming, fire danger may be on the rise. I hope to see you there.

SPEED IS DANGEROUS IN PBH. In mid-February a mom and her children were nearly hit crossing Linden in front of a flashing school bus when a driver came around the corner too fast. This is just one of the many risks that drivers take when they travel too fast in PBH. That decision could have dramatically changed the lives of the kids, the mom, and the driver. That is not the only risk for drivers who speed on PBH roads. At least a couple of times every month, an incident occurs on the roads that requires BMFPD to close all or a part of a PBH road for emergency purposes. When you see Firefighters or Third Arm personnel with stop/slow signs, immediately slow down and prepare to stop quickly. If you are driving too fast, especially on corners, you will not have the time to do this properly. You will endanger our volunteers and yourself. Once you do stop, always stay in your lane, even if you are in a hurry. Trying to go around in the opposite lane without express instructions from emergency personnel is asking for a disaster. Finally, please be polite to emergency personnel. They are volunteers trying to protect everyone's safety.

LET'S UPDATE THE HOA EMAIL LIST. At the HOA we try to keep an up-to-date email list of every current resident. This allows us to keep you informed of upcoming events in the neighborhood. More importantly, it allows us to notify you quickly of warnings, updates, etc. about incidents that happen in PBH. In January, there was a water main break on Wild Horse Circle in nasty weather. With an up-to-date email list, we were able to quickly notify residents of progress getting their water back on. If we don't have a good email address, you won't get warnings or updates from the HOA. I have been getting several "undeliverable" replies to recent HOA emails. If you haven't gotten any emails from me in 2018, please send me your current email address.

FIRESIDE CHAT By John Benson

Hello from Boulder Mountain Fire Protection District. Just think, spring and summer are right around the corner. We really haven't had a hard winter to speak of, but let's hope that we get some good snows between now and the end of spring.

Do WE HAVE A BREAK IN THE WILDFIRE SEASON? We are monitoring long-term weather forecasts and talking with Fire Behavior Analysts and meteorologists about what they may be seeing in the longer-range forecasts for our areas. Everyone that we have talked with says there is the potential for warmer temperatures and below normal precipitation. As we all know, this can change in a heartbeat. We are looking ahead and preparing for the worst of conditions.

Some may think that because we have had several snows we are in good shape. That is not quite true. The way the weather has been going so far, we get snow on the ground, and then it is gone due to winds and increased temperatures. It does not take very long for the one-hour fuels, such as grasses, to dry out rapidly. Last year we started off our fire season at the end of February with the Wagon Wheel Gap Fire, which burned 4.7 acres. This trend continued for us in Boulder County for quite a while. So, the answer is no. We really do not get a break in our wildfire season anymore.


We need everyone's support to ensure that we reduce the likelihood of a fire in our neighborhoods. We need residents to

stay vigilant during these periods. Our crews and equipment continue to be at the ready in the event of a wildfire. Our members will be attending several wildfire refresher classes coming up this spring. BMFPD's Public Information Officers will distribute essential information as our conditions change throughout the season.

NEW ROOKIE CLASS. I am pleased to announce that BMFPD has 17 new members going through our Rookie training which started at the end of February. We are very lucky to have such a great group of new members. While a lot of the country is in desperate need of volunteers, we continue to be very well supported in this district with willing and able residents who become emergency responders. This says a lot for our community. We continue to build for our future here at BMFPD.

Once again, I want to thank all of you who support BMFPD in our mission. Your support comes in many ways. I, along with the staff, are grateful. Let's stay vigilant and let's hope for a quiet season. Until next time, give us a wave when you drive by us, or say howdy, and most of all, "let's be fire safe."





MITIGATION By Mike Palamara

2018 is shaping up to be another busy year in wildfire mitigation due to ongoing homeowner and community projects and a recent influx of grant funds into the fire district. This work has led to our largest crew since the program's inception in 1999. In addition to our four year-round employees, we are happy to have eight returning seasonal crew members from 2017. We have added three new staff who bring a combined 10 years of wildfire experience from around the nation.

Our larger wildfire mitigation crew will provide a higher quality of response to 911 emergencies within our fire district. Our 15 crew members are obviously wildfire certified, but also include seven members with medical response capabilities and five with structure fire qualifications.

The Wildfire Mitigation Program (WMP) is hoping for a quiet 2018 season, but recent lack of moisture and wind is a concern. The winters of 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 have been incredibly dry. The three largest 2017 wildfires in Boulder County occurred in January, February and March of last year. Unfortunately, our wildfire "season" has recently proved to be year-round. If it rained all summer, that would be fine with us!

Some of the forest thinning we worked on with the PBH HOA has resulted in the production of slash piles. These piles of vegetation are intended to be burned when there is snow cover. Recent winters have not been very productive for snow cover, so the WMP has been working on alternatives to burning, including adding a very small, portable chipper. We have successfully completed testing. While it is a slow and tedious process, we've been able to mitigate a portion of the slash piles throughout the community.

We recently finished a mapping project of wildfire events in and around our fire district. The map above excludes wildfires of less than 1 acre in size and provides a record of wildfires from 1988 to present. The white area on the map is Boulder Mountain Fire's district and the red areas are past wildfires. As is evident by the map, we have been extremely lucky with wildfires as compared to many of our neighboring fire districts. A portion of this can be attributed to the diligence of our residents to the dangers of wildfires and not providing the ignition opportunities for wildfires to start. Wildfire mitigation is as important as ever. The recent lack of moisture and history of wildfires in our area demonstrate that wildfires will continue to be a concern for the foreseeable future.

THE WMP CREW ARE THANKFUL TO PINE BROOK HILLS RESIDENTS FOR THEIR CONTINUED SUPPORT AND PARTNERSHIPS TO BETTER SITUATE THE COMMUNITY FOR THE NEXT WILDFIRE EVENT. 
Welcome Spring with Your Neighbors By Brian Wahlert April 24 HOA Meeting

This quarter's HOA meeting will provide an opportunity for residents to become more informed about two important areas.

WATER BOARD CANDIDATES: This year, for the first time in many years, more residents are running for the Pine Brook Water board than seats available, so an election will be held. The April 24 HOA meeting comes at the perfect time to meet the candidates. All candidates will be invited to share their views on the Pine Brook water system, and what we can do as a community to ensure its sustainability for the long term. Register to vote with your Pine Brook address, if you're not already registered, and come to the meeting to learn about the candidates.

WILDFIRE MITIGATION PROGRAM: Boulder Mountain Fire's mitigation crew is available to help you make your property more defensible. The majority of your HOA dues, supplemented by public grants, fund projects that span across property lines to protect the neighborhood as a whole. These services set us apart from other mountain communities. Mike Palamara, Superintendent of our mitigation crew, will discuss 2018 mitigation plans at the April meeting.

Both presentations will be held at the Community Center at 1907 Linden. Bring a dish to share for the potluck dinner at 6:00PM. The program starts at 7:00PM. Come for one or both, as your schedule allows. Hope to see you there!



PINE BROOK HILLS WATER DISTRICT ELECTIONS

In even numbered years Colorado Special Districts, such as Pine Brook Water and Boulder Mountain Fire hold elections for positions on their Board of Directors. For the first time in a number of years, the Water District has more residents running for election than open positions. In 2018 we will elect three directors for four-year terms and one director for a two-year term filling a total of four open seats.

All candidates in this year's election were invited to submit a short statement about themselves so residents could get to know them and learn about their priorities for PBWD. Their biographies appear here in alphabetical order. The April 24 HOA meeting is another opportunity for residents to meet the candidates, learn about their views on the Water District, and become more informed prior to voting.

Mail-in ballots are due by May 8. If you are not already registered to vote, register now and plan to participate in this important election. We are all keenly aware of the importance of Pine Brook Water to our neighborhood. Having a water utility increases our property values. Fire hydrants not only protect our homes; they decrease our insurance rates. The reservoir prevents us from having water shortages and supports firefighting throughout the area.

MEL BEAUPREZ

I am the third-generation of my family to call Boulder County home. I grew up on a dairy farm near Lafayette and attended schools in Louisville. After earning Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from the University of Colorado, and certification in School Administration from the University of Northern Colorado, I became a teacher and then an elementary and middle school principal with Boulder Valley Schools for thirty years.

I've lived in Pine Brook since 1970 and have been a member of the Water Board since 1995. With my roots in agriculture, I have always been appreciative and protective of the necessity of water in our arid surroundings. When I moved to Pine Brook, our water source was a few wells to supply water for approximately 100 homes. Since then, both the supply and quality of the water have improved through the installation of a state-of-the art micro-filtration system and the community-supported construction of our reservoir.

I believe the Water District is on the right track to continue with work to update our water rate structure so that we can be secure in meeting our financial obligations and rebuild funds to plan for future capital repair and maintenance.



SIGNE HAWLEY

As a candidate for the PB Water Board of Directors, I am committed to building on the current work to ensure that the water district is sustainable in all of its practices. I will work to leverage the community's experiences, along with both internal and external experts to create a robust long-term strategic plan.

FAMILIAR FACES: FEATURING JEAN WATSON By Penny Triggs

Many residents choose to live in PBH for a long time. They've found that living here brings a quality of life and sense of fulfillment that they wouldn't find elsewhere. This issue's Familiar Faces column features a long-time resident who raised her family here, stayed through many of life's transitions, and still calls PBH home.

We have a wonderful artist in our midst. Jean Watson, a long-time resident, lives in a cozy home tucked into a hillside. She shared the home with her husband Keith until he died last year. On my visit I was struck by the gentle beauty of her watercolors that hang throughout their home. Jean told me she hadn't started to paint much before she found herself raising four young girls. She would paint "before the kids got up." In the past, Jean has participated in Boulder's Open Studios held annually in the area and plans to do so later this year when the event comes around again. She is a frequent participant in Boulder Mountain Handmade, the local art fair sponsored by Boulder Mountain Fire Auxiliary.

One good-sized piece depicts Lava Falls in the Grand Canyon, an area where Jean and her husband Keith loved to river raft. It is the type of painting that pulls you in with curiosity. The colors are soft hues. All is fluid motion. Lingering, and looking closer, I imagined I spotted a blue raft riding playfully, wildly, through a mass of roiling waters, Keith and Jean having the ride of their lives!

Their house is all about comfort. Snug spaces, treasures throughout...a row of miniature model T cars across a mantel (Keith loved cars from the 50's), a small-sized stained glass kaleidoscope that I just had to pick up and look through.

As Jean and I were sitting talking, her daughter Leigh arrived and joined the conversation. The two of them began to muse about earlier years when the family lived close to the site of the Climax mine on Fremont Pass outside of Leadville. Keith had been hired to work at the High-Altitude Observatory in that location. They lived there for a number of years after Jean and Keith graduated from CU (graduated and married the same day, by the way). They "couldn't believe" their luck at "being paid to live and work in the mountains!" These were two adventurous young people who loved to backpack and river raft. Jean told me they eventually relocated to Pine Brook Hills, but not before a few years spent living on Olde Stage Road. Their house faced the intersection where Lee Hill makes a sharp downhill turn to the juncture of the roads. It was when Jean saw a car go off the edge (before the current guard rail) and watched the driver leap out before the car rolled down to the creek below that they decided it was time to relocate. Time to have a safer view from their front porch!

Before I left, I asked Leigh to share a meaningful characteristic about her mother. She said, "my mom is the type of person that no matter what life hands you, you just get on with it."

Several educational workshops will be scheduled during the weekend, including a New Resident Welcome session with Chief John Benson. This presentation focuses on mountain living and fire safety.
