PBH HAS A NEW LOOK

Pave you noticed? Pine Brook Hills has a new entry sign – it's wonderful. Thanks to all of those who helped to make this happen.

A new entry sign for Pine Brook Hills has been an HOA topic for *many* years. The old sign was out of date and deteriorating. As you might expect, with the opportunity to create a new sign, there were a significant number of opinions about what it might look like.

The members of the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) and the HOA Board got the project started in January of 2014 as the first "Community Enhancement" initiative. Thanks to Mike Von Hatten and the ARC for keeping this project moving in the early phases. The project solicited input from residents and a number of folks got involved in one way or another.

Jim Eyster (ARC member) worked with Burt and Andria Lewis who own the property upon which the sign is partially located. Burt and Andria were extremely generous and community spirited in providing an easement for the location and maintenance of the sign. Joyce Colson and Rob Quinn prepared legal documents for the easement. Once executed, the documents were recorded with Boulder County.

Mike Von Hatten (ARC Chairperson) proposed a design using local sandstone slabs as a durable, easily constructed, and cost effective solution. A budget was prepared and presented to the PBH HOA Board, who approved it in March 2015. The project really got into high gear when the ARC reached consensus about the general look and feel for the sign in Spring 2015 and Tim Triggs (ARC member) took on the role of project manager. Tim built a scale model and brought it to the HOA general meeting in July and the ARC and HOA Board approved a design based on that model in August.

Working with Noah Steele, the master craftsman at Tribble Stone in Boulder, Tim coordinated stone fabrication, demolition and site preparation (special thanks to EZ Excavating Company), as well as installation of the sign. PBH residents Fred Wolf, Charlie Springer, and Julius Hummer (alias "The Alder Lane Boys") worked with Tim as the on-site construction crew.

Solar powered lighting of the sign will be completed soon by the ARC. Landscaping will be done in the spring with John Cathy heading up that effort. John plans to chair the new PBH garden club and this will become the club's first project.

Many people worked together and volunteered much time and effort to get this accomplished – PBH Thanks You Very Much!

Just in case you did not know, the Architectural Review Committee is one of the hardest working committees within the HOA. In 2014 they took on the additional role of working on "Community Enhancement Initiatives." The PBH entry sign is the first of those projects. Another initiative that is currently in the works will be located at the intersection of Linden and South Cedar Brook. This site is being used to stage materials and equipment involved in the water main project along lower Linden by the Pine Brook Water Department, but will soon yield a much more appealing arrangement that has been described in previous Pine Brook Press articles. PRESIDENT'S PATTER By Brian Wahlert, HOA President

\//ith the change to a new even-numbered year comes a new

V president of the HOA. Before I introduce myself, I want to recognize the extraordinary efforts of the outgoing president, Allen Saville. During the September 2013 flood, a boulder the size of a small car tumbled down the slope and lodged itself in the upper floor of Allen and Marla's home, rendering the house unlivable. Despite that, Allen signed on for a two-year term as president of your HOA. Throughout the year-plus home rebuilding effort, he served our community admirably not only as president but also as a BMFPD



firefighter, maintaining one of the department's highest call response rates. Allen talks a lot about the importance of volunteer effort in keeping our community great, and he exemplifies this ethic of community service.

Allen's house is now beautifully rebuilt, better than ever, and Allen has completed his two-year term as president, but he will continue to serve on the HOA Board as our member at large and as a BMFPD firefighter. Thank you Allen for your outstanding service to our neighborhood.

So what about me? My family had the good fortune in 2010 to move from the Seattle area (a great place) to Boulder (the most spectacular place to live that I know of.). After moving to Boulder, we learned that you don't have to actually live in the city to enjoy the amenities of Boulder. You can be in the foothills, perched on a ridgetop on several acres of land with distant mountain views in a beautiful ponderosa pine forest with deer, foxes, and the occasional bear or bobcat for company, and still be less than 15 minutes from downtown Boulder. You pay less for your house than a comparable house on a postage stamp-sized lot in town. And you still get all the amenities of the city – excellent utilities (thanks, in part, to the often heroic efforts of Bob de Haas in Pine Brook Water), paved roads that are plowed well, and a bus to take the kids to the Boulder Valley schools.

So when Dave and Allen asked me in 2013 to sign on as HOA vice-president, I didn't hesitate. I'm grateful for the countless hours of volunteer effort that have made Pine Brook the amazing place that it is today, and I'm glad to do my part to contribute.

Heading into 2016, Pine Brook is in an especially good place.

- The mountain pine beetle threat has abated, thanks to the efforts of Suzanne Adams, Jo Davies, Brian Ridley, Jim Adams, and all the Beetle Busters who inspected properties and recommended mitigation to protect our forest.
- While we choose to take a risk living in an area with high wildfire danger, Chief John Benson, Mitigation Coordinator Mike Palamara, and all the volunteers at Boulder Mountain Fire continue to serve our community incredibly well. We've been fortunate with lower wildfire danger in the past year, but when fire comes again, I can't imagine a better department to protect us than BMFPD.
- Thanks to extensive flood repairs and additional significant maintenance work, the average pavement quality of our public roads increased from 2012 to 2015, for the first time in two decades. And the County has included in its 2016 budget funding to repave all of Linden this year! The PBH street that constitutes the majority of the drive for the majority of our residents will be brandnew by the end of this coming summer. Big thanks to Peter King-Smith and others who have worked tirelessly on this issue over the years. Those steady efforts are paying off in a big way.

Sure, no place is perfect. The Tussock Moth is attacking the Douglas Fir forest just outside Pine Brook. Excessively fast and erratic driving threatens human and animal life. We don't yet have funding to repave Pine Brook's aging roads, except for Linden.

But I'm not thinking about a pothole here or there when I'm marveling at a spotted fawn right out my window. Or watching my six-year-old as he photographs flowers and insects and collects rocks. Or listening to my three-year-old giggle and say "higher, higher" as he rides our tree swing.

So here we are, four years after moving into Pine Brook, and the magic hasn't worn off. Every day, we marvel at the beauty out our windows and the incredible natural playground for our young boys. I'm confident that with the ongoing effort of residents who love our community like I do, we can continue to make Pine Brook Hills an even more amazing place to live. ARC UPDATE By Mike Von Hatten

Fast Track Review: The PBH ARC is developing a fast, simple process to review exterior construction in an effort to better serve the community. For small projects not requiring a Boulder County permit or requiring only an "EZ Permit," residents can contact the ARC by phone or email to discuss the review and approval of their project. A simple "ARC Fast Track Application Form" will be posted on the PBH website for use by applicants. Residents can submit their application and project information by email. This information will be emailed to the ARC members for review, comments and in most cases, approval in several days. No need for residents to wait for or attend the monthly ARC Design Review Meeting. Approvals will be digitally executed by at least three members of the committee and the approval will be stored in the ARC database. Approvals will also be noted in ARC Design Review Meeting Minutes.

The Boulder County EZ Permit is an "easy" simple permit issued for smaller, limited scope projects as listed on the Boulder County website (bouldercounty. org). The application form for an EZ Permit is available online. Applications can be made by fax or in person, over the counter, at the Boulder County Land Use offices at 2045 13th Street.

Digital Document Format: The ARC is also revising the submittal of project documents and the storage of information to a digital format. Most architects, engineers and contractors have adopted the use of digital documentation. Other documents are easily scanned to a digital format. This approach will simplify and improve document distribution, storage and retrieval.

ON THE WATERFRONT By Bob de Haas

2016 is an Election Year! Two Water Board Members are up for election: Kirk Hendricks and Rick Waters. Both positions are four (4) year terms. Both Board Members have said they will run for re-election. If you feel you would like to be on the Board and would like to stand for election, please get in touch with Robert de Haas, Manager and current election coordinator, who will get you the forms and information needed. Anyone desiring to run for the Board must file a Self Nomination Form by February 26, 2016 or have filed a Write-in Candidate Notice by February 29, 2016. Bob can be reached at 303-443-5394. If there are no more candidates by March 1, 2016, the election will be cancelled.

Linden Pipeline Project – By the time this article comes out, this project should be done except for the repaying of Linden which will occur in April and May of 2016. The repaving project is a coordinated effort between Boulder County and the Pine Brook Water District. The District's obligation under our road cut permit to put in the pipeline was to simply mill 2 inches of the pavement off and put down an overlay. The County decided that this was a good time to take advantage of the work being done and to completely repave the road from the City Limits to North Cedar Brook as a joint venture between the two entities. By late next spring that entire section of Linden will be completely repaved (both lanes)! While we all have to endure the road through the winter, we have something to look forward to by next summer!

Water Treatment Plant Project – This project is starting to wrap up. Soon we should be done and will have restored our ability to produce the amount and quality of water to pre-flood conditions. This will be good news for everyone!

Reliable Supply Pipeline – This last project will occur around April of 2016 and involves adding a second pipeline between "upper" and "lower" Pine Brook. The flood destroyed the use of our wells that served as the emergency supply for lower Pine Brook, if the one pipeline we had to deliver water to lower Pine Brook failed. With the installation of this pipeline, the District will have two connections. In the case of a failure of one pipeline, the other can continue to deliver water. This is a much better solution than trying to recover the wells!

The best news for last! The projects described above plus all of the other flood damages that we have been repairing have almost entirely been paid for through FEMA and State Grants! If not for these grants, the District would have been in trouble to fund the needed repairs. The total of these grants will be about \$3,000,000.00 (three million dollars). This would have worked out to a cost per home of about \$7,500.00. Hope you're as pleased as we are!

FOREST HEALTH -BEETLEBUSTERS ADVISORY By Jim Adams

Our Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic has abated, but the Douglas-fir Tussock Moth is coming. The picture above shows dead Doug-fir forest half a mile west of Pine Brook Hills (healthy Ponderosa Pine and Doug-fir are in the foreground). Vigilance and removal of Mountain Pine Beetle brood trees did limit damage to our Pondy forest. Now we can defend our Dougfirs.

Tussock Moth larvae kill trees by eating their needles during warm months. Eggs are laid during late summer, they overwinter and hatch in late May. The female does not fly, she lays a frothy mass of eggs on her cocoon. Tiny hatched larvae go to the top of a tree to eat tender new needles and they eat lower needles as they grow.

Look for these cocoons now.







The caterpillar is pretty, but its hairs are irritating and are built into the cocoon - so do not touch either. Small larvae disperse in the

breeze by sailing on threads.







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HEALTHY LIVING: BURNING ISSUES By David and Vanja Bortz

Hello neighbors! We are two of your friendly neighborhood professors. We moved to PBH in 2010 just in time to get evacuated for the Four Mile Fire. That didn't deter us and we've greatly enjoyed living here ever since. At our day job, we do modeling and statistics of biological, environmental, and medical systems. Over time, we've come across several pieces of science that we think are important to share, particularly with regard to using wood as a heat source. So, please keep the following in mind as the weather turns colder:

- Smoke from wood is very harmful. It contains benzene, formaldehyde, and dioxin as well as polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAH) and other volatile organic compounds (VOC) at concentrations that are carcinogenic.
- The best wood burning stoves on the market (EPA Phase II approved) are still 200 times more polluting than natural gas. Moreover, this is only true when the stove is new – as they age, they pollute more.

- Smoke particles are so small that they filter into homes even with the doors and windows sealed. The level of indoor smoke pollution is typically equal to 70% of the outdoor smoke levels.
- One hour of fireplace chimney smoke exposure is roughly as bad as smoking 30 cigarettes (in terms of carcinogens). This hurts children and pregnant women disproportionately more, as they breathe more air per body pound than other people.
- Wood is not "clean energy." Annually, heating with wood produces 97 lbs. of pollution, while heating with natural gas produces less than 0.2 lbs. of pollution. The energy density of natural gas is also about 3.5 times more than wood, which means that wood pollutes substantially more as it is transported.
- Despite these facts, wood enthusiasts have successfully lobbied to get burning wood labeled a renewable resource and obtain renewable energy tax credits. This greatly undermines the efforts on truly renewable resources like wind and solar.
- It's tempting to think that the wind will dissipate the pollutants from the chimney. However, due to our



mountain topography, the smoke often doesn't go up and dissipate, but hangs out low and deposits nearby (especially in the winter, or when it rains or snows, or when there are clouds).

- Hot smoke goes up initially, but then it cools very quickly and 90% lands within 100 yards of the chimney.
- Burning two cords of wood produces the same amount of carcinogenic particles as driving a gasoline-powered car 130,000 miles (at 20 miles/ gallon).
- The city of Fort Collins says, "The City recommends that you avoid using your fireplace or wood stove to protect the health of yourself and your neighbors." Moreover, they have a loan program to help homeowners replace their fireplaces with natural gas heaters. Many other cities in the nation are doing the same.

So, if you consider burning fires this winter, please don't do it often, and be mindful of your neighbors. Many of us live up here because we appreciate or depend on clean air. Let's not pollute it unless we absolutely have to! Or, consider switching to natural gas fireplaces.

DAVID HUMMER

November 4, 1934 to December 17, 2015

One of the earliest residents of Pine Brook Hills died on December 17, 2015. David Hummer with his wife Janet and son Julius, lived here at the

end of Alder Lane for 47 years. When they bought the land in 1966 there was no Alder Lane, only a little path. They followed it and were rewarded with a splendid view of the back range. They had a one-lane track dug to the site and a year later began building their home. They brought water in for the first few years. Some years later the track was widened through the combined effort of David



and Kirk Hendricks. In those early days lower Linden ran past horse pastures and the first rise in the road was known as the Goat Lady's Hill

because an elderly woman had a wooden house and barn there and kept goats. Altogether they drove past only about six houses on their way up to their house on the top of West Point, as the hill is called on maps.

In addition to being a physics professor at CU and one of PBH's earliest residents, David was a brewer extraordinaire. He co-founded Boulder Beer in 1979. David will be missed by his family, neighbors, and friends.

2015 BMFPD FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to **Kirk Bach** who is the 2015 Fire Fighter of the Year for Boulder Mountain Fire Protection District.



Kirk grew up in Pine Brook Hills and began volunteering with the Department during the summers while he was in high school 20 years ago. He attended college at Fort Lewis College in Durango where he took his first emergency medicine class so he could serve as an EMT when he was home from college in the summers. Once his chemistry degree was completed, he returned to Boulder to join the family business and moved back to PBH.
