Do you love architecture, design, and want to help this uniquely beautiful foothills community? If so, then please contact either Rob or Natasha to learn more about being a volunteer on the Architectural Review Committee. The Pine Brook Hills ARC is an integral part of our community, reviewing and approving new houses, additions, and all exterior work on homes. At this time, we are seeking to add at least two more people to the committee. The requirements on your time would be minimal — there are scheduled meetings on the second Tuesday of every month where we discuss any proposed new houses or large additions. Currently, these meetings are held via Zoom in order to be Covid-safe. You would also need to be available to look over and vote by email on simple "fast track" matters such as paint colors, new siding, or new roofing. That's it. The only other requirement is a desire to keep the architecture in Pine Brook Hills faithful to the guidelines set out in the 2010 Pine Brook Hills Unified Covenants, which are that all houses should be in harmony with the natural surroundings and with each other. It's an important mission that we take seriously. We are here to help educate owners, contractors, and GCs to understand and follow the PBH Covenants and construction guidelines. If you have an interest in keeping the architecture of Pine Brook Hills in harmony with our beautiful natural surroundings, you would be just the right kind of person to join us on the committee. #### **DOCK IS HERE**

A zombie weed proliferates in Pine Brook Hills. When dock establishes its roots, it is very difficult to remove. Usually, a root will quit after its foliage has been topped a few times with a hoe. A dock root will not die; it grows more. Photos show dock seeds last August in Two Mile Canyon, a root that has been topped


many times, and not-recommended form of biocontrol down on the flats (prairie dog). To curtail this aggressively invasive plant, bag the seed head and dig out as much of the root as you can. With your help, we can eradicate this harmful plant species from our neighborhood.

# STATION TWO

onstruction of the new Station Two is underway. Wait, what's Station Two, and why is this important to you? For those new to the neighborhood or just tuning in, Station Two is located in Boulder Heights at 50 Overlook Lane. "Station Two is essential to continuing to meet our mission, which is to provide rapid, effective, and organized responses to fire, medical, and other emergency situations," said John Benson, Boulder Mountain Fire Protection District's Chief.

Boulder Mountain Fire, with over 125 rostered volunteers, is tasked with securing commitments for \$1.25 million toward the overall \$3.5 million cost of the project by the end of 2021. One district resident promised to donate \$100,000 if the community raises \$300,000 over the remainder of 2021. Excluding that offer, we've raised approximately \$600,000; half of the \$1.25 million needed.

Well, one could say that's twice as much as the average listing price for a home in Pine Brook Hills, according to Realtor.com! Worry not. "This is not Taj Mahal," said Bob Loveman, President of the Board of Directors for Boulder Mountain Fire, "Station Two, in its current form, is truly obsolete."

Most residents of Pine Brook Hills are already aware of Station One on Linden Drive. Many drive by it to and from their homes. Station


Two, which is part of our fire district, was dated to say the least. In fact, in March 2020, the old wiring in the building started a fire. Fire in a fire station apparently doesn't last long, as it was extinguished by a crew.

See the map for the locations of the stations. In this mountain community, it is said that everyone protects everyone. In other words, first responders may come from any station within the district regardless of neighborhood in response to a medical, fire, or other emergency call.

Every volunteer firefighter and every member of the Auxiliary (the support arm of the Fire Department) have been asked to support the capital campaign effort. When you're considering your 2021 charitable giving, keep Boulder Mountain Fire in mind. 





#### **NEW RESIDENTS**
